- 1. Expansive Approaches to Knowledge Students will be aware of and be able to explain multiple ways of understanding the world (scientific and cultural).

- E. Students will be able to creatively solve problems by combining knowledge, ideas, and expertise in original ways.
- F. Students will be able to sustain a line of inquiry when the outcome is unknown.
