

SELECTED COMPOSER FOCUS



Jocelyn Hagen (*Hymn to St. Theresa*) (b. 1980) has written music described as "simply magical" (Fanfare Magazine) and "dramatic and deeply moving" (Star Tribune, Minneapolis/St. Paul). From large-scale multimedia works, electroacoustic music, dance, and opera to intimate choral works and classical solo vocal pieces, Hagen is at home in many genres. Her music has been featured on several Wind Orchestra concerts, including her commissioned work celebrating the 150th anniversary of Carthage Women, "Shieldmaiden.""Hymn to St. Teresa" is a re-visioning of the "Sanctus" and "Benedictus movements" of her large choral work, AMASS, for wind band.



Winnie Brückner (Oh Jesus, Sweet Child) (b. 1979) was born in Görlitz, Germany, near the Polish border. Brückner studied jazz singing and composition at the Franz Liszt Academy of Music in Weimar and at the Lucerne Jazz School. As a singer, she is a member of an early music vocal ensemble, Vox Nostre, and is a founding member of the treble-voices a cappella ensemble *niniwe*. She is also an award-winning composer and has received first prize in the German Choral Association composition competition. Brückner's setting of "Oh Jesus, Sweet Child" is a unique melding of her heritage and musical passions; the original tune is a 17th century German carol that Brückner crafts into a modern choral arrangement bubbling with interlocking mixed-meter rhythms and vocal jazz harmonies.



Armenian-American composer Alan Hovhaness (1911-2000) cemented his place as one of the most prolific composers of the 20th century with over 500 works in his ouevre, including an impressive 67 symphonies. Composed in 1941, *Psalm and Fugue* elegantly fuses Middle Eastern aesthetics with an opening that is reminiscent of a Renaissance chant, inviting a listener into a soundscape that is both familiar and unknown. Simple and welcoming, plaintive and powerful, the psalm section ends in a monolithic crescendo leading immediately into the fugue subject as introduced by the second violins. Layers upon layers of string colors are added as the subject travels throughout the orchestra, culminating in a massive, glorious, unified catharsis.



Dr. Rosephanye Powell (*The Word Was God*) (b. 1962) is a sought-after composer, conductor, and vocal pedagogue. Currently on the voice faculty at Auburn University, Dr. Powell's varied catalog of choral works has become standard repertoire for university and secondary choruses around the country. As a scholar, her research focuses on the art of the African American spiritual and voice care concerns for voice professionals, and she is in demand across the country as a guest lecturer and conductor. In her piece "The Word Was God," she uses layers of repeated musical patterns called *ostinati* to construct the musical texture, unleash harmonic dissonances, and gradually build musical suspense in this modern, rhythmic, exciting work.
